Message from Chairman

Hope, Healing, and Humanity: Our Journey of 20 Years

Dear Humanity First Family,

As we reflect on 2024, I am filled with immense gratitude—for the opportunity to serve, for the strength granted by God Almighty, and for the unwavering support of our volunteers, donors, and partners. Since Humanity First USA was established in 2004, we have grown into a dynamic, volunteer-driven organization that has reached over 5.3 million people across the globe. Together with our Humanity First family in 65 countries, we have now served more than 16 million people through our eight core programs.

This year, we continued to respond to urgent needs—from highly visible humanitarian crises like in Gaza, to Hurricane Helene's devastation on American soil, to underreported flooding in Tanzania. At the same time, we deepened our long-term investments in education, healthcare, and clean water. We launched our Orphan Care program in Indonesia, expanded our school network, and continued to operate Nasir Hospital in Guatemala—an iconic symbol of what collective compassion can build.

In 2024, we also launched our first-ever global "Walk-Run-Bike for Humanity" campaign, logging over 35,000 miles to raise awareness and support for critical needs. Our 13th annual Telethon brought together supporters from across the country to sustain and grow our impact.

None of this would be possible without the people who power our mission. I extend my heartfelt thanks to the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community USA, whose members and auxiliaries have been the backbone of our volunteer force. From food pantries to disaster relief, from fundraising to mentoring youth, the dedication of all our volunteers and partners is unmatched. I also thank our Doctors4Humanity medical professionals, our growing network of Humanity First Student Organizations—now on over 50 campuses—and our youngest volunteers in Kids4Humanity, who are learning early what it means to serve others.

Humanity First's strength lies in its ability to act—swiftly in times of crisis, and patiently in long-term development. Whether it's by performing a cataract surgery that restores sight in hours or by operating a school that nurtures a child for years, we remain committed to the dignity and potential of every human being. We believe that putting humanity first means seeing ourselves in others and working together to build a more just, compassionate world.

Thank you for being part of this journey. With your continued support, we look forward to the next chapter of hope, healing, and humanity.






Over 44 million people in the United States—including 7 million children—experience hunger and food insecurity.

Sites

The HFUSA Food Security program in the U.S. operates from 9 locations, of which 7 are partner sites with the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community, 1 HF stand alone pantry in Duluth, and in New York City food is taken directly to distribution locations assigned by the city.

We partner with local food banks in Duluth, Hawthorne, Willingboro, New York City, and Fort Worth.




Growth


In 2024, Humanity First USA joined with the Food Bank for New York City to begin serving food, primarily in the Bronx. Our first distribution in April fed 100 families in need with essential items such as milk, bread, tuna, fruits, assorted vegetables, and pasta. The volunteer team, led by Aslam Mohammad, continued tirelessly all year to reach families on the streets and parks of NYC.

The HF Duluth Food Pantry: Our First Standalone Food Pantry A Milestone of Service

In February 2023, Humanity First USA opened its first standalone food pantry to the public.

The pantry distributes both purchased food and donations from local partners, including federal and state programs such as The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) and Georgia Nutrition Assistance Program (GNAP).

In addition to food distribution, the pantry provides referral services for SNAP, Medicaid, and Medicare.

Who We Serve:

- 54% of our clients have Limited English Proficiency
- 7% are elderly
- 49% are children

2024 Highlights:

- Partnered with Atlanta Community Food Bank to access food at reduced rates
- Distributed over 222,000 meals
- Served 2,245 families nearly 11,000 individuals
- Welcomed 284 volunteers 98% of whom are new to Humanity First
- Received a \$32,500 grant from Gwinnett County under the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)





We are 16 institutions away from our goal of operating 48 primary & secondary schools.



Empowering Vocational Skills

Our 3 vocational centers all offer courses in tailoring, a skill that is particularly attractive to women seeking opportunities for self-sufficiency. The HF Ahmadiyya Vocational College in Liberia also offers courses in computers, refrigeration & air conditioning, catering, and driving.



Growth

- Two school complexes, one each in Mali and Burkina Faso, are under construction. These complexes comprise 6 more schools towards our goal. We aim for 2 additional schools in 2025.
- Donor opportunities for annual school and vocational center sponsorships can support scholarships, facility upgrades, and extra student programs.

TEP Beginning

Worked with local partner to build 40 new homes with solar electricity for victims of flooding in Pakistan.





Access to healthcare is essential, but it's also expensive—and sometimes, it's just not available. Less developed countries pay the price: low-income countries have a life expectancy that is 18 years lower than that of high-income countries.

Humanity First USA tackles this problem through a multi-pronged approach that delivers care to as many people as possible. Humanity First builds hospitals, operates mobile medical clinics and medical missions so people can access healthcare from cities to remote villages.



Local Medical Care

- The Bamako Medical Center in Mali and Asih Sasama Clinic in Indonesia both provide consistent long-term care.
- Medical missions organized by local teams are cost effective in providing essential care to local communities.
- HF Guyana organized seven missions in 2024, and we are exploring expansion to more countries.



Gift of Health Missions

- Three HF Student Organization (HFSO) Gift of Health missions treated over 2,100 patients in Guyana, Guatemala, and Mexico! The trips pair US students and volunteer medical professionals with physicians and staff from the host country to offer free medical screenings, dental care, and medications in underserved areas.
- The HFSOs of the University of Toledo, Loyola University Chicago,
 Temple University, and the University of Toledo College of Medicine
 stepped up to arrange the missions. 43 students—our future leaders
 and medical professionals—joined these missions under the guidance
 of 6 physicians who traveled from the U.S. to see patients and mentor
 the students! We are also grateful to the 80 host country team
 members and physicians who anchored the medical camps.



New Medical Mission

HFUSA Doctors4Humanity members traveled to the Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI) for the inaugural mission of a new partnership between HFUSA and the RMI Ministry of Health. Our team worked with staff of the Leiroj Kitlang Memorial Health Center to treat over 100 cardiology patients on Ebeye Island.



Ghana Capacity Building Mission



The Mission

- From July 17 to July 25, 2024, an 11-member HFUSA team traveled to Ghana to conduct capacity building training
- Over 100 healthcare professionals were trained in:
 - Ultrasound guided peripheral nerve block
 - Laparoscopic surgery
 - · Basic CPR and first aid

Future Missions

Currently exploring opportunities to expand similar missions in various specializations in HFUSA partner countries.



Worldwide, nearly a billion people suffer from preventable or correctable vision impairments. Imagine not being able to see just because you can't get eyeglasses. Or losing your vision because you can't get routine cataract surgery. That's the case for millions of people.

That led Humanity First to start the Gift of Sight program, which works to restore and maintain people's eyesight. Eye care missions expand access to screening and prescription glasses; free cataract surgical missions restore eyesight to those who might otherwise go blind; and ophthalmology clinics provide stable eye care in places where it otherwise wouldn't be available.



Local Gift of Sight

Eye health and surgical camps in Burkina Faso and Mali extend healthcare while strengthening local capacity. We are exploring more countries to expand cataract surgeries, such as Tanzania and Lesotho.



Gift of Sight at Nasir Hospital

In April, the first joint Gift of Sight mission under the partnership between HFUSA, HF Healthcare Services, and Loyola Medicine, went to Guatemala. The international volunteers worked closely with the staff of Nasir Hospital to screen patients for eye health, prescribe treatment and lenses, and perform more than 60 eye surgeries to clear people's vision. Gift of Sight missions are part of the development of the Nasir Hospital Ophthalmology Department for long-term, comprehensive eye care.



Safe and clean drinking water is a fundamental human right. Yet over 1 in 10 people worldwide do not have access to clean water.

Humanity First provides clean drinking water solutions to communities that need it the most. We refurbish dozens of hand pumps a year and install new ones when needed. We dig boreholes and water wells, and we provide solar-powered equipment and overhead reservoirs to store water so it can be used in schools, healthcare facilities, and villages.






Children who are orphaned have experienced immense tragedy at a young age.












Detroit Dinner









Nasir Hospital Regional Impact




Medical Services **Timeline**

Masroor Center of Healthcare Abidjan, Ivory Coast

• UTCOM/Temple: May 19-26, Guatemala - 1,068 patients


